Our Charge

We believe that in order to improve the quality of life for all Houstonians and all Texans we have to incorporate the Latino experience in the decision-making process, yet only 7% of elected officials in Texas are Latino even though Latinos make up nearly half of the state's population.

We're tackling this leadership gap head-on by electing the next generation of leaders and disrupting the status quo.





Our Story

In 2015, a group of Houstonians formed the Latino Texas PAC to engage and elect the next generation of leaders in Texas politics. Since then, we have given way to an organization that belongs to each of us, and which amplifies our individual voices and power.

We are an all-volunteer board made up of leaders from various sectors including business, education, law, and non-profit, who believe in changing the status quo, so that Latinos in Houston and across Texas have the type of representation that will create the change our community deserves.

Our Presence

Events

We organized and co-sponsored five events including our annual membership meeting, a meet-and-greet with Representative Joaquin Castro and our endorsed candidates, the State of Latino Education, a town hall with TEA regarding the latest developments with HISD, and our annual holiday party. These events serve as the foundation for advancing our mission of engaging and preparing the next generation of Latino leaders.





Block Walking

We volunteered over 700 hours, block walking, phone banking and raising money for our endorsed candidates. We canvassed underserved and Latino neighborhoods that often go unnoticed. From Pasadena to the East End to Near North Side, we were excited to engage our neighbors, learn about the issues impacting the broader Latino community in Harris County, and share our support for Latinos running to disrupt the status quo.

Candidate Spotlight

Below are the highlights of five candidates we proudly endorsed in 2019 who are disrupting the status quo for the Latino community.



Judith Cruz

- Previously ran in 2014 for the HISD School Board and lost by 43 votes
- She ran again for the HISD School Board in 2019 and defeated the incumbent with 66% of the vote
- Nonprofit director, education advocate
- Latino Texas PAC contributed \$5,000



Fidencio Leija

- First-time candidate
- Currently, the only Latino elected to Santa Fe City Council and second Latino ever elected to the position
- · Navy veteran, business owner
- Latino Texas PAC contributed \$2,000

Christina Morales

- Longtime member of the Latino Texas PAC
- First-time candidate and top vote getter in initial eight-way contest; won runoff election with 61% of the vote
- Business owner, philanthropist
- Latino Texas PAC contributed \$5,000



Ornaldo Ybarra

- Only one of two Latinos elected to Pasadena's eight-member city council, a city with a nearly 70% Latino population
- Marine veteran, police lieutenant
- Latino Texas PAC contributed \$1,500





Robert Gallegos

- Incumbent who was first elected in 2013
- Re-elected to Houston City Council with 67% of the vote
- The only Latino elected to Houston's sixteen-member city council, a city where nearly half of its residents are Latino
- Longtime career in public service
